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# Fiscal Update From Our Treasurer

#### Funds from the CARES Act provided our District with One-Time Funds to Meet Pandemic Related Needs

The global pandemic caused by Covid-19 has presented many challenges to our educational system over the past year; however, at Tri-Rivers Career Center (TRCC) we were prepared to change our teaching methods to a virtual setting since we have been a school of one-toone computers for many years.

For most of our students remote learning was a totally new concept. Tri-Rivers, along with our local education community, worked together to provide the services and support necessary to meet the needs of our students both at the secondary and adult levels as they learned from home last spring.

We are tasked daily with meeting the needs

of the whole child while ensuring students, educators and staff are healthy safe, and successful The COVID-19 pandemic has proven how essenti is to meet these needs and has also idded an increased sense of urgency to he task.

We continue o respond y employing innovative strategies to address the social emotional, physical and educational challenges of the pandemic that will continue to benefit students, educators and our communities

This pandemic has put stress on our District's budget over the past year; however, we have been fortunate to receive additional money to help offset some of these costs. Tri-Rivers

as we move forward.

Career Center and

Center for Adult Education was awarded federal funding through several grants made possible by the CARES Act. This additional financial support has permitted us to address concerns for ensuring equity; social-emotional learning and behavioral health; increased professional development for staff; student nutrition; updated technology infrastructure; and adequate personal protective equipment and disinfecting tools.

The money from the CARES Act provided our District with one-time funds to meet pandemic related needs—needs which we may not have otherwise met within our normal budget.

These federal funds made it possible for the Career Center to keep its doors open while adhering to Centers For Disease Control guidelines and offering our students continued learning opportunities via a hybrid model for the first five months of the 2020-2021 school year and more recently with full face-to-face classes five days per week.

The one-time CARES Act money is not a windfall of cash to our school district. It is restricted and dedicated to needs caused due to the pandemic and it comes with guidance on how we are permitted to spend it—mainly on the continuity of operations, alternative and extended learning opportunities and credit recovery for students needing extra assistance in their academics.

The Tri-Rivers Board of Education, Superintendent, Treasurer, Administrative Team, Instructors and Support Staff work tirelessly to provide a quality education to our students at a fair cost to our taxpayers.

Our Administrative Team works hard to identify student and district needs and the Superintendent, Treasurer and Board of Education develop a budget to ensure adequate resources to meet those needs.

We cannot control what happens with the State budget, but we can continue to operate in an open and transparent manner and make decisions that are intentional, purposeful, and with our students' best interests at heart. We want you to know that we are responsible stewards of your tax dollars and will continue working hard to make sure all students are successful and career ready when they leave us to enter the workforce.

# Swivl System Purchased with 2020 TEACH Grant From the Marion Community Foundation Improves Learning for TRCC students

While the Swivl system isn't much to look at, what it does is beautiful for the students in Tri-Rivers' programs. Cosmetology Instructor


Becky Salyer says, "It's all about maintaining connections with my students and effectively addressing the challenges of teaching remotely."

"A handful of students really take to remote learning; the vast majority do not," Salyer explained. Swivi technology—a video system which follows instructors around the classroom—allows a more natural teaching style. Rather than standing in one spot for a camera, Salyer

explained, the Swivl follows a tracking lanyard and focuses on the wearer's face. She retrained her Swivl to follow her hands so she could clearly demonstrate detailed techniques, such as rolling a perm. Her students can use it to go back over lessons, step-by-step, as many times
